From the Administrator



To the Community:

It is with great pleasure that I present the 2017 Annual Report to the Miami-Dade County community. The year 2017 presented us with many challenges. The Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County (DOH-Miami-Dade) worked together as a team to meet these challenges while at the same time expanding its services.

Two task forces were convened to develop recommendations to target public health issues. The Office of the Mayor, the Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership and DOH-Miami-Dade convened the “Getting 2 Zero” Task Force. The task force developed recommendations to target support services and innovative social policies with the goal of “getting to zero” new HIV infection and AIDS cases. In 2017, 15,465 HIV tests were performed by DOH-Miami-Dade staff and partner agencies.

The first ever Opioid Addiction Task Force was convened by Mayor Carlos Gimenez, in partnership with the State Attorney General Katherine Fernandez-Rundle, the Department of Children and Families, the Board of County Commissioners’ Chairman Estevan Bovo addressing the growing opioid and heroin addiction in our community. These task forces were held in conjunction with our local, state and national partners, and it is through these combined efforts that we were able to increase our reach.

Another first ever was the DOH-Miami-Dade Partner Fair and Conference, bringing together 165 exhibitors and partners to provide information on community services and resources. Other team programs this past year were: the first meeting of the Local Public Health System Assessment meeting which seeks to achieve optimal health by using their resources wisely, and the DOH-Miami-Dade Epidemiological Team, which continues to monitor the cases of pregnant women and newborns affected by the Zika virus.

Last but not least, was Hurricane Irma which resulted in inland flooding, downed trees and powerlines and widespread power outages. Special needs shelters were opened throughout the county and DOH-Miami-Dade staff provided client care to approximately 270 clients.

I am extremely proud of the work of our staff and partners and what we have accomplished in 2017. I want to take this opportunity to thank you for all your efforts in support of the work of the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County. More importantly, I want to sincerely thank you for all your future efforts on our behalf. I look forward to the next year with confidence; that together as a team we can meet the new challenges that lie ahead!

DENTAL CARE

The Seals on Wheels Dental Program

“Seals on Wheels” is a mobile dental program that provides preventive dental services and oral health education to children enrolled in Miami-Dade County Public schools with a 90% participation rate in free and/or reduced lunch programs. Services are provided on school grounds, during school hours through a collaborative Memorandum of Agreement with the Miami Dade County Public School System. The services provided include: dental examinations, dental cleanings, oral hygiene instruction, dental sealants and fluoride varnishes.

2017 Accomplishments

- Provided 6,453 dental services to 1,454 school aged children
- Partnered with the University of Miami Pediatric Van in the summer months to provide dental services and outreach at the Center for Haitian Studies
- Provided dental services to 15 schools in South Miami-Dade County

Upcoming Goals for 2018

- Expand dental services to schools located in the Little Havana Community
- Provide outreach services to children at the San Juan Bosco Center
- Increase the number of children and services provided on the van through our partnerships with the Early Learning Coalition and the United Way

Dental Clinic at Peñalver Medical Center

The Dr. Rafael Peñalver Dental Clinic, located in Little Havana, provides


comprehensive dental services to children and adults. The clinic is staffed by Florida Department of Health employees and includes two Florida Licensed Dentists, one Registered Dental Hygienists, an expanded duty dental assistant and two front desk clerks. The dental clinic opened in October of 2015, through funding from a LIP Grant (low income pool). This opening increased access to dental care by providing affordable, high quality dental services to the uninsured and underinsured population in Miami-Dade County. The services provided at the clinic include oral examinations, dental cleanings, periodontal treatment, oral hygiene instruction, dental sealants, surgical and nonsurgical extractions, emergency dental treatment, dental fillings and restorations.

2017 Accomplishments

- Provided 16,957 dental services to 944 patients
- Partnered with the Refugee Health Assessment Program to provide dental appointments for newly arrived immigrants to the United States
- Partnered with Community Action Agency to provide follow up dental services to children originally seen on the dental van.
- Participated in the Back to School and December Health Fairs at The Peñalver Clinic.

Upcoming Goals for 2018

- Provide an outreach clinic day for the surrounding residents of Little Havana.
- Partner with WIC to increase the number of children and pregnant women seen at the clinic.
- Increase the number of patients seen at the clinic.





FAMILY PLANNING

In fiscal year 2016-2017 the family planning program participated in numerous outreach and health fairs throughout Miami-Dade County. The program participated in over 47 health fairs, conducted 103 presentations and participated in one radio interview and one live interview on social media. Over 9,500 educational materials were distributed during these outreach events to promote health educational messages and clinic locations and services. Family planning was able to expand clinical operations by providing clinic hours at night and on Saturdays in order to accommodate clients who work typical business hours of 9am-5pm. The clinic has been a success in a short time frame by providing services to an additional 396 clients thus increasing access to care. In addition, the family planning program provided over 328,674 services to 18, 098 unduplicated clients and a total of 19,343 client visits.

Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program Quick Facts




The National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program as administered by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funds the Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (FBCCEDP). This funding serves approximately **6.7 percent** of the eligible, at-need population in Florida.

Eligibility Requirements:

- Females between 50 and 64 years of age, and
- Household income at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, and
- Uninsured or no insurance that covers screenings.

The Miami-Dade BCCEDP provides a vital link to screening, diagnostic, and treatment services for women.



During FY2016-17

The Miami-Dade Program Provided:

- 5,575 breast screenings and diagnostic services
- 1,056 Pap tests and cervical diagnostic services
- 2,516 women with mammogram screenings
- 1,029 women with Pap tests

Detected:

- 26 breast cancers
- 8 cervical cancers and pre-cancers

Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program

The Florida Breast & Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (FBCCEDP) is a special program for uninsured women, who are between 50-64 years old. The FBCCEDP provide a vital link to screening, diagnostic, and treatment services for women who are residents of Miami-Dade or Monroe County. Free or low cost services are provided through partnerships with public and private primary care physician, hospitals, and diagnostic centers.

2017 Accomplishments

- FBCCEDP Miami Dade provided 5,575 breast screenings and diagnostic services and 1,056 Pap tests and cervical diagnostic services.
- Detected and provided treatment for 26 women diagnosed with breast cancers, and 8 women diagnosed with cervical cancers and pre-cancers.
- In Partnership with Community Health of South Florida Inc. (CHI), the program provided breast & cervical screenings to 839 women living in areas with high rates of late state diagnoses for breast & cervical cancer.

Upcoming Goals for 2018

- Increase breast & cervical cancer screening in the Haitian community through partnership with the Center for Haitian Studies.
- In partnership with Jackson Memorial Hospital Breast Health Center, screen 200 eligible women for breast cancer.
- Expand screening services in Homestead through Baptist Homestead Hospital
- Partner with the Zonta Club of Key West to increase screenings in Monroe County
- Partner with CHI to screen 600 eligible women for breast & cervical cancer
- Host 2 screening days in partnership with the Jackson Memorial Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit.



SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

The Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County school health program has statutory responsibility in cooperation with Miami-Dade County Public schools for supervising the administration of the school-based health services provided to children in grades pre-kindergarten through grade twelve including performing periodic program reviews. The provision of school-based health services is in collaborative program between the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County, Miami-Dade Public system and participating partners. Funding comes from a variety of sources, including the Florida Department of Health, Local school districts, Health care districts and Public/ Private community partners.

2017 Accomplishments

The school health program was restructured with the aim to improve the quality of school health services provided in the school settings and thus increasing stakeholder satisfaction. Objective:

- Improve information flow, decision-making and communication between partners.
- Identify new authorities and accountabilities.
- Assess the skills, knowledge, and experience of department employees including potential and readiness for new assignments.

- New performance requirements and expectations, goals, and training for existing staff.
- Review and update job requirements, goals and training for new staff.
- Develop and implement a programmatic organizational chart.

In 2016, Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County partnered with Nicklaus Children’s Hospital to provide basic and/or consultative school health services to all students at 62 Miami-Dade County public schools using telehealth technology, including telehealth virtual visits, trainings and guidance to students, parents, and school personnel. Also, to provide school health nursing services including mandated screenings and chronic disease management. Nicklaus Children’s Hospital was able to provide six telehealth assessment and 32 health education presentations within the first few months of service.

Established a relationship with the Charter Schools in Miami-Dade in order to improve communication and completion of mandated health screenings and health services in all public schools including charter schools.

Upcoming Goals for 2018

- Continue services to 19 comprehensive schools
- Hire additional school health staff to provide school health services to 45 additional basic schools.
- Monitor the data submission from all partners to ensure all school health services provided Miami-Dade County are being recorded and accounted for in The Health Management System (HMS).
- Continue to work with charter schools to develop and implement a plan that focuses on the performance of the completion of mandated school health screenings.
- Continue working with participating partners and Miami-Dade County Public School District to deliver high quality, effective and comprehensive school health services to all students from Pre-Kindergarten through twelve grade in Miami-Dade County.



VITAL STATISTICS


Vital Statistics are official records of birth, death, marriage, and dissolution of marriage. However, only birth and death records are available through the Miami-Dade County Office of Vital Statistics. These records are essential for just administration of our law and for the protection of individual rights. In addition, the statistical data from these records are of great value to public health and other agencies. People may need certified copies of these records for:

- passports
- school entrance
- employment
- proof of citizenship
- governmental benefits
- insurance

The Office of Vital Statistics has two core business functions.

- Review of birth and death records for completeness and accuracy before acceptance as permanent records.
- Prepare and deliver certified copies of Vital Statistics as requested by the public, government and private agencies.

Certified copies of birth and death records may be ordered in person at one of our three locations, by mail, by telephone (toll free) at 1-866-830-1906 or via the internet at www.miamivitalrecords.com. Fees from the sale of Vital Statistics contribute approximately \$2 million in annual revenue to Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH & ENGINEERING

Accomplishments 2017

According to Environmental Health Database in 2016-2017 Environmental Health and Engineering staff conducted more than 30,000 inspections including complaint investigations. The programs in Environmental Health and Engineering include Public Drinking Water system, on-site sewage treatment system, Healthy Beaches, Indoor Air Quality, Biomedical Waste, Body Piercing, tanning, Migrant Labor Camps, Mobile Home Parks, Group Care, Food Hygiene, and Public Swimming Pools.

Environmental Public Health submitted a county local fees proposal for Environmental Health (EH) services. This proposal was approved in September 2017 by the Miami Dade County Board of Commission via resolution # 17-65. This resolution is aimed at keeping Environmental Public Health programs more sustainable i.e. self-sufficient in budget in order to recruit required or needed number of professional staff to keep up with the constant and sharp increase in services and businesses regulated by DOH. These added fees have the potential to add up to one million dollars to our total revenues. EH staff responded to the Zika outbreak in Miami Dade County in 2016. EH staff conducted Zika assessments in the community in partnerships with County and City officials.

Purpose of assessments was to identify and baste mosquito breeding conditions, share educational materials, provide mosquito repellents and deploying other mosquito control measures following best practice.

EH has been representing DOH in Miami Dade County on the City of Miami Beach Initiative “Metro Lab - Fight the Bite”. Research, Development and Deployment of Projects, Programs and Protocols to eliminate and Address the Impacts of Climate-related Diseases (including Zika). This initiative is aimed at developing the science of Climate-related Diseases including Zika. Such as improving practice and science of mosquito control including prevention, surveillance, laboratory testing and analysis, pesticide application, and community engagement.

EH - Drinking Water programs received excellent ratings by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) in their implementation of the Florida Safe Drinking Water Act. In fact, our Lead and Copper Program is a model program nationwide in terms of compliance and practice. Note, MD-EH regulates one of the largest water systems in the US. Additionally, in 2017, two EH staff, Julian Bronholz and Angela Faulk, received recognition letters from Florida Governor, Rick Scott.

ADAP

The Federal AIDS Drug Assistance Program allows for persons with HIV/AIDS, who are uninsured or who do not have adequate prescription coverage, can get access to life-saving medications. Applicants must meet (1) HIV Patient Care Core Eligibility requirements and (2) ADAP Program Qualifications.

Locations:

- Flagler Street: ADAP Program & Pharmacy, serving approximately 4,000 clients
- West Perrine: ADAP Program Office, serving approximately 400 clients

ADAP-Miami in 2017 highlights

- The program served more than 4,500 unduplicated clients
- Formulary expansion Phase 1: 40+ medications were added to the formulary
- 90-day PUSH for eligible clients: 40 out 360 eligible clients are enrolled
- Q-Flow System: effective Patient Management & data for Continued Quality Management (CQM) efforts.

- The pharmacy expanded the business hours by 15 %
- Received Test & Treat clients for continued access to treatment through ADAP
- ADAP Data to Care allows for the tracking of clients whose adherence is not optimal

- Achieved & maintained a CD4 <200 among < 6 % of the total clients (lower % = better)
- Continued coordination with the Ryan White Part A Program in Miami-Dade for the provision of outpatient medical care services to uninsured and insured ADAP clients



EPIDEMIOLOGY & DISEASE CONTROL

The Epidemiology and Disease Control program serves as the frontline response to emerging public health issues in Miami-Dade County. This program monitors and investigates infections for more than 80 different diseases, animal bites, outbreaks and other public health threats. Throughout 2017, the team was instrumental in adding to the epidemiological knowledge regarding Zika virus through the collection of data and publication of original research. The team has also continued to monitor the cases of pregnant women and newborns affected by Zika virus during its heightened activity in Miami-Dade County. Aside from Zika-related activities, Epidemiology staff aided in facilitating the creation of the Miami-Dade County Opioid Taskforce report, and continues to educate the community and stakeholders about the state of the opioid epidemic in our county. The team continues to engage in surveillance and prevention activities for many other communicable diseases that impact the health of Miami-Dade County residents and visitors.

FOOD & WATERBORNE ILLNESS

The Food and Waterborne Disease Program in Miami-Dade does surveillance and investigations of illness complaints and outbreaks related to food and water exposures. During 2017 there were over 450 complaints received from various sources including the public, by phone and using our state floridahealth.gov web site, regulatory agencies, physicians and hospitals, the Florida Poison Control Network, the website Iwaspoisoned.com and our reportable disease database.

There were over 30 field investigations at restaurants, nursing homes, day care facilities, bakeries, schools and caterers. These investigations included food workers with Hepatitis A and Salmonella, cases of Legionella in nursing homes, foodborne illness outbreaks in restaurants, cases of Ciguatera poisonings at restaurants, local markets or fish caught recreationally, Norovirus at a local event and in prisons, and an E coli investigation in a day care facility.

ASTHMA HOME-VISIT COLLABORATIVE

The Asthma Home-Visit Collaborative between DOH-Miami-Dade and Jessie Trice Community Health Center (JTCHC) began on June 19, 2017 and is tasked with improving the quality of life in asthmatic children (ages 7-10 years old) who have missed 7 or more days of school for asthma-related illness/hospitalization. The collaborative goal is 20 participants. As December 31, 2017, 17 families have been enrolled. Out of the 17 families, 7 have only completed the 1st home-visit, 4 have only completed the 2nd home-visit and 6 have completed all 3 home-visits. Three families are no longer enrolled in the program. As of December 31, 2017, 14 families are still enrolled in the program.

During the home visits we were able to evaluate indoor environmental quality conditions, complete the Asthma Knowledge Assessment with each family, and also complete a Home Visit Survey which evaluates asthma attack and medication history.



HEALTH HOMES & LEAD POISONING PREVENTION

During the 2017 calendar year, the Miami-Dade Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (HHLPPP) achieved many goals and objectives in the prevention, early identification, and effective management of childhood lead poisoning as well as environmental home hazards. The HHLPPP conducted several screening, outreach, surveillance, and primary prevention activities to help address these two issues. The Miami-Dade HHLPPP is working to continue to provide outreach and management services described in this report that will help protect children from lead poisoning and environmental home hazards. Among the program's accomplishments during the 2017 calendar year include:

- The Miami-Dade HHLPPP provided education and case management services to 115 clients (from Merlin database) found to have high Blood Lead Levels.
- With funding from a State of Florida legislative grant, the HHLPPP staff screened 496 uninsured children for lead poisoning and tested 939 clients for hemoglobin in 2017.
- The Miami-Dade HHLPPP attended 11 community events and 1 radio program, and educated hundreds of families about lead poisoning prevention and Healthy Homes issues in 2017.
- The Miami-Dade HHLPPP also distributed 1638 educational flyers on lead poisoning and asthma.

BIOTERRORISM SURVEILLANCE UNIT

During 2017, the Bio-T Surveillance team continued its work in bioterrorism response preparation and the enhancement of infectious disease surveillance. BioWatch exercise planning began in early 2017, and planning activities were scheduled and conducted periodically until the end of the year, with five planning meetings culminating in a successful exercise conducted in February. The main objectives of the exercise converged into evaluating the BioWatch program capacity to timely identify and adequately respond to a BioWatch Actionable Result (BAR). In March, the BioWatch program conducted a risk communication workshop in preparation to adequately inform the community in the event of a bioterrorism incident. The BioWatch program also prepared and implemented a Phase I Sampling Responder Training exercise in November as a means to prepare the HazMat Team for technical and unflawed environmental specimen collection when circumstances merit its application. In addition to Bio-T preparation and response activities, the team investigated eight cases of Meningococcal Disease, providing antibiotic prophylaxis when indicated, and calling attention on the fact that the agent strain had changed from serogroup W-135 to serogroup C.



IMMUNIZATIONS

The Immunization program's annual accomplishments included initiating the daycare project, meant to improve immunization compliance of children under two. We began visiting daycares in January 2018. As of March 2, 2018 they have reviewed a total of 6152 records, of which 541 were out of compliance (10%). In addition to the daycare project, the program targeted children and adults that had not returned to DOH clinics to complete the HPV vaccine. 5064 reminder letters were mailed to these clients. Another achievement of the immunization program included a Go Green Initiative which was successful in implementing the use of e-fax services, significantly reducing paper usage and clutter as well as reducing cost and improving customer access to care. In addition, the team established an alternative billing procedure to secure revenue through the creation of organizational codes. Funding was secured for several large companies including Animal Services and South West Key Inc. Because of the yellow fever vaccine shortage in the United States, the Immunization program was selected to participate in a clinical trial to protect the public from yellow fever transmission by providing Stamaril. Stamaril is an unlicensed vaccine in the United States so clinical trial protocols were approved in order to provide the vaccine. As of March 6th, 2018, 552 doses of Stamaril have been provided. Significant improvements were also made regarding the safety of the vaccine supply by funding and installing SensoScientific in all clinics.

HEPATITIS

The Hepatitis Program continues to increase outreach activities in group homes, restaurants, correctional facilities, homeless shelters, and drug rehabilitation centers to provide services aimed at decreasing the burden of hepatitis complications in the community. The staff excels in providing a large quantity of services which target individuals at high risk of contracting viral hepatitis. In 2017, the Program saw a substantial increase in the number of reported acute hepatitis A cases in Miami-Dade. This number gradually increased from 22 cases in 2012 to 47 cases in 2016 and ultimately 125 cases in 2017. The public health response provided by the Hepatitis Program during this cluster of cases focused on conveying concerns to close stakeholders who diagnose acute hepatitis A cases. During Infection Control meetings, the program presented on the importance of prompt case reporting for immediate case investigation and public health interventions to contain the spread of Hepatitis virus in the community. In 2017, per best practice methods, we began requesting hepatitis A specimens from healthcare providers. These specimens are sent to the Bureau of Public Health Laboratories for viral sequencing in attempt to detect an epidemiological link among cases of hepatitis A cases. In 2017, 2,988 vaccines were administered, 1,698 hepatitis panel and rapid hepatitis screenings were conducted, there were 1,101 hepatitis referrals for linkage to care, 196 outreach activities, and 1,161 nursing assessments.



CLINICAL LABORATORY SERVICES

Laboratory professionals help reduce morbidity and deliver the right care to patients and clients. In 2017 clinical laboratories provided more than 258,000 lab services for patients who visited the STD, TB, Women’s Health and the Refugee Health Assessment Clinics. Over 58,000 tests have been performed in-house during patients’ visits that helped to initiate treatment promptly for patients’ and public health benefit.

Laboratory tests are the most cost-effective, least invasive source of the objective information used in clinical decision-making, and drive 75% percent of clinical decisions from diagnosis through therapy and prognosis. Each day laboratory professionals working at the Department of Health in the Miami-Dade clinical labs help to reduce morbidity and aid the delivery of the right care to clients.

In 2017 more than 24,000 clients of the health department clinics and the Refugee Health Assessment Program have been screened for TB infection using blood test interferon-gamma releasing assay. About 21,000 newly-arrived refugees have been tested for the presence of intestinal parasites. More than 21,000 patients and clients have been tested for HIV infection, including 4100 patients screened at the time of visit with the rapid point-

of-care HIV-1/2 assay. The laboratory played a critical role in the Zika outbreak response in Miami-Dade County in 2016-2017: more than 2900 pregnant women and their partners have been tested for Zika virus infection. Laboratory staff also participated in disaster response activities after hurricanes Irma and Maria.

As a part of collaborative projects between DOH-Miami-Dade and the Ukrainian Ministry of Health, the lab hosted an official Ukrainian delegation of epidemiologists and laboratorians. During the visit, Ukrainian colleagues were introduced to DOH policies and best practices on HIV diagnostics, prophylaxis, prevention, linkage to care, and community involvement. Such partnerships will help collaborative partners to develop and implement effective practices into their public health organizations to fight the HIV epidemic.

In 2017, the Lab also participated in a statewide laboratory system improvement program (L-SIP) assessment supported by APHL, and will continue to work on implementing developed recommendations for lab system improvement.

STD / HIV PREVENTION

The Florida Department of Health Miami Dade (DOH-Miami Dade) STD/HIV Prevention Program is committed to advancing the goals of the National HIV/AIDS Strategy (NHAS):

1. Reducing new HIV infections
2. Increasing access to care and improving health outcomes for people living with HIV
3. Reducing HIV-related health disparities

Forty-one out of the sixty-seven counties saw an increase in newly diagnosed HIV cases from 2015 to 2016, however an annual decrease was observed in three of the seven largest reporting counties: Hillsborough (-1.8%), Pinellas (-4.4%) and Miami-Dade (-5.5%).

Collaborations

Partnered with Jackson Memorial Hospital to routinize testing in the Emergency Room. The program was launched on 6/27/17 and as of 12-31/17:

- 15,465 HIV tests were performed
- 15,024 HCV tests were conducted
- HIV seropositivity was 2.4%
- HCV seropositivity was 5.1%

Partnered with Jackson Memorial Hospital and University of Miami to provide rapid access to care and treatment to newly diagnosed individuals. This was the second year of the VIP Test and Treat Program. Currently the program has 120 patients and the average time to viral suppression is 62 days. The VIP Test and Treat Program boasts a 97% retention rate with the average time for the patient receiving medication being same day or next day. The VIP Test and Treat Program was expanded to Borinquen Health Care Center in November of 2017. Partnered with the Ryan White Program to expand Test and Treat services to RW providers in Miami Dade.



DOH-Miami has partnered with Homestead Hospital to roll out syphilis screening in the ER in January of 2018. This new test will be complementing their current HIV testing program and is in alignment with the Florida's Plan to Eliminate HIV infections in Florida. DOH-Miami also partnered with UHealth Clinics at Walgreens to create a bridge in the community for linkage to care, T&T and PreP referrals.

FDOH Miami-Dade partnered with AIDS Healthcare Foundation (AHF) clinic located in Miami Beach to imbed a DIS staff to provide disease intervention and partner services for high risk patients obtaining services at AHF. We're expecting to increase partner services by 20% by June 2018.



GETTING TO ZERO TASK FORCE

The Mayor of Miami-Dade County had a resolution with Florida Department of Health to create the Miami-Dade County HIV/AIDS ‘Getting 2 Zero’ Task Force that was charged with developing a strategic action plan on addressing the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Miami-Dade County. The task force started its mission in September 2016 and in January of 2017 released a report with 16 recommendations that target prevention and research, care and treatment, social support services, and systems and policies. The task force was comprised of over 25 members that represent different entities, including hospitals, universities, government, substance abuse community, and leading health insurance plans, that have provided their resources and are committed to reducing new infections and increasing access to care. Out of the 16 recommendations, 12% are complete (n=2), 31% (n=5) are on track towards completion, and 56% (n=9) have no progress.

GETTING TO ZERO AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

On June 6, 2017, the STD/HIV program received County support to proceed with the 1st Miami-Dade branded condom and establishing “Getting 2 Zero” awareness week on the third week of February. The “Getting 2 Zero” awareness week is a movement to reduce new infections, increase access to care, reduce stigma, and to promote health equity in the community. The Office of Community Advocacy in Miami-Dade County and The Florida Department of Health have made a community investment to address the HIV/AIDS epidemic, establishing the Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS “Getting 2 Zero” awareness week in alignment with the Mayor’s “Getting 2 Zero” (G2Z) taskforce recommendations. This movement encourages Miami-Dade County to come together and enhance the quality of life by eliminating HIV/AIDS and supporting zero stigma.



Other accomplishments

Opened a PrEP clinic at 1350 in 2016 and the clinic became fully operational in March 2017. In 2017, 275 clients received PrEP through our clinic. Opened a STD clinic in West Perrine four days a week for services to the community to help reduce STD infection rates, FDOH in Miami-Dade STD-HIV Program entered into MOA's within the community to offer 23 additional sites. These sites offer screening and some will offer treatment during traditional and non-traditional hours at both stationary and mobile sites. 7 of these sites are in high schools where students had high rates of chlamydia.

Goals for 2018

- STD/HIV Program plans to open new PrEP clinics
- VIP Test and Treat will be expanded throughout the county
- Implementation of the second phase of the Getting to Zero Awareness Campaign
- STD/HIV Program will begin a project with Miami Dade County Public Schools aimed at increasing testing within priority schools.
- Conduct public health detailing of physicians to support implementation of routine HIV testing and PrEP throughout Miami Dade County.
- Implement a county-wide PrEP referral system

- Provide Telehealth services for PreP and Test and Treat at DOH clinics
- Coordinate and train community ambassadors to educate and disseminate PrEP messaging throughout Miami Dade County.
- In April 2018, FDOH will be partnering with AIDS Education & Training Center (AETC Program) to provide a symposium for public and private providers, practitioners, social workers, and health service representatives. This symposium will focus on: epidemiology and prevention of congenital syphilis, routinized testing of HIV and syphilis in emergency rooms, and impact of opioid crisis in the community.
- FDOH Miami-Dade will be conducting enhanced testing of multiple anatomical sites for resistant strains of Neisseria gonorrhoeae tested in FDOH-Miami-Dade STD Clinic. STD clinic will obtain specimen and submit to lab to perform culture, isolation, identification, and storage of Neisseria gonorrhoeae. The epidemiologic data will be sent to CDC.
- Q-Flow client queuing system at Health District Center will take place in CASS, STD Clinic, and laboratory to improve the timeliness and efficiency of clinical services performed in the STD Clinic.
- FDOH Miami-Dade will be able to make contact with partners that are found on adult mobile dating apps of infected patients to identify locatable information to conduct field investigation.
- Establish a FIMR project to address Congenital Syphilis in Miami Dade



PERINATAL HIV PREVENTION

By the end of 2017, there were 102 pregnant women with HIV who received Perinatal HIV services, including 97 deliveries and 1 HIV infected baby. The Perinatal HIV prevention program provided linkage services to 88% of HIV-infected post-partum women ensuring they have access to contraceptive/family planning and preconception care services after delivery. Similarly, the program has routinized HIV/STD screening at Jackson Memorial Hospital’s Emergency Department and OB Triage at the main campus and Jackson North OB Triage.

In the areas of education and outreach, the Perinatal HIV program became members of the Healthy Baby Task Force and Black Initiatives Network. Likewise, the Perinatal HIV Program distributed 300 palm cards marketing the “Protect Yourself, Protect Your Baby” Campaign during The Black Initiatives Network’s “Street Reach, Health Reach” activity. Another 602 palm cards were supplied to the Miami Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership to be distributed with their OB/GYN Healthcare Provider Awareness Campaign mail out. Also, the program conducted five educational sessions with medical professionals, who participate in the care of HIV infected pregnant women, educating them about the requirements of Florida law and ensuring that they are aware of community services available for HIV infected women and HIV infected or exposed infants. Similarly, the program staff conducted an educational session with staff members of Jackson Memorial Hospital emergency rooms to increase provider awareness of their responsibility to utilize the High Risk Pregnancy Notification and Newborn Exposure Notification forms and act on behalf of the HIV infected pregnant women and their HIV infected or exposed babies. Educational materials and resources were given on the proper treatment guidelines for HIV in pregnancy. The program also presented for the quarterly AIDS 501 update training.

HIV/ AIDS SURVEILLANCE

The HIV/AIDS Surveillance Team at the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade is proud to deliver service excellence to our health care providers and community members. This program continues to educate health care providers about HIV/ AIDS in order to eliminate & reduce new infections. The team also works closely with the STD/ HIV Prevention unit to identify and assure early treatment for newly infected HIV+ patients, link them and their partners into care, and to retain them in care. For the first time, the team has begun exceeding CDC Benchmarks of having at least 85% of cases linked to care, and has reported a 2.2% reduction in HIV cases and a 10% reduction in AIDS cases this reporting period.

TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL & PREVENTION

The Tuberculosis Control and Prevention Program (TB Program) works to identify, treat, and prevent the spread of tuberculosis disease in Miami-Dade County. This is accomplished through the operation of clinical, investigative, surveillance, community partners' education and outreach services.

The TB program provides clinical services in three different clinics (North, Central and South), and manages entirely all the reported cases of Tuberculosis in Miami-Dade. The clinical and nursing teams continue to work collaboratively with the private practitioners in treating TB cases and ensuring treatment compliance.

TB preventive treatment is expanding, especially in several priority risk groups of people living with HIV, people on biologic treatments and children under 5.

From 2009 to 2017, the TB incidence has dropped from 6.3 to 3.6 which represents a 43% decrease. In 2017, 99 new cases of TB were reported (down from 115 in 2016), equivalent to a 14% decrease.

The latest treatment outcome data show a treatment success rate of 97% in 2016, similar to recent years. There were 7 reported TB cases co-infected with HIV-positive which represents 7.7% of the total number of cases. . One person was started on treatment for multi drug-resistant TB in 2017, compared to 2 in 2016 who have completed treatment. TB treatment success remains high, at 97% countywide.

In 2017, the Tuberculosis Control and Prevention Program has served a total of 3,724 clients with 18,541 returned services. A total of 59,145 TB-related services were provided. The program completed 99 TB contact investigations throughout the year.



PUBLIC HEALTH PREPAREDNESS

Our Program

The Public Health Preparedness Program (PHPP) develops local plans and procedures to better prepare our agency to respond to, mitigate, and recover from emergencies and disasters that threaten the health of the public. The mission of the PHPP is to ensure essential public health and medical services continue during disasters or emergencies impacting the community. We do this by collaborating with all Florida Health in Miami-Dade County (DOH-Miami-Dade) programs as well as a wide variety of federal, state, and local partners, hospitals, and volunteer organizations to improve resilience and maximize our capacity to recover quickly.

Accomplishments in 2017

The PHPP successfully led National Association of County & City Health Officials (NACCHO) Project Public Health Ready application process. The DOH-Miami-Dade received national recognition for demonstrating readiness and preparedness to respond to public health emergencies.

The PHPP team successfully planned and executed a Special Needs Shelter (SpNS) exercise. The exercise simulated key response activities in shelter operations and served to train DOH-Miami-Dade staff on shelter needs

and expected tasks. Lessons learned from this exercise and from real-world operations during Hurricane Irma are being utilized to guide planning and training efforts for DOH-Miami-Dade responders.

Alazandria Cruze, our Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) Coordinator, in partnership with the North Miami Beach Police Department, presented during the DOH-Miami-Dade Community Resource Fair on how to protect ourselves during an active shooter situation. The success of this presentation prompted the development of a training workgroup on this topic.

The CRI team created an electronic point of dispensing (POD) registration system to be used during events requiring the public to receive prophylactic medication. This system is the first of its kind in the state of Florida and is designed to decrease the time it takes to move the public through PODs during emergencies. Once the system is fully implemented, the registration system will be shared as a model throughout Florida to ensure the entire state can more rapidly meet the needs of the community. Additionally, this system may be adapted for use during other emergencies, including the activation of the Special Needs Shelters.

The PHPP team also developed team building activities to engage all programs in preparedness activities with a focus on communication and effective teamwork. Since the Fall of 2016, the PHPP has conducted 10 interactive sessions for DOH-Miami-Dade programs.

Goals for 2018

The PHPP utilizes lessons learned to continually evaluate and improve our processes to satisfy our overall mission and vision for preparedness. The PHPP team is focusing on streamlining trainings to target specific functions and gaps to increase agency-wide readiness. The CRI team will focus on increasing our partner network to support response efforts during catastrophic events. The PHPP team will also be engaging in internal cross-training to ensure continuity of operations. Additional trainings focusing on active shooter response and “Stop the Bleed” initiatives are being developed and will be disseminated in 2018.



WOMEN, INFANTS, & CHILDREN

WIC is the nation's most successful & cost-effective public health nutrition program. We provide wholesome food, nutrition education, breastfeeding support & community referrals for income-eligible women who are pregnant or postpartum, infants, and children up to five years old. Whether we're lending moms a sympathetic ear, providing them with free and healthy food, or referring them to outside care and social services, we hope to give them the resources, knowledge, and tools they need to be the moms they want to be.

In 2017, Miami-Dade WIC provided services to 117,877 residents via our 16 service centers located throughout Miami-Dade County. A key priority is to improve breastfeeding rates in our community, and in 2017, an average of 83.4% of WIC mothers in Miami-Dade County attempted to breastfeed their infants. This is an achievement as we have exceeded Healthy People 2020 goals for this indicator. In addition, an average of 45% of WIC mothers in Miami-Dade breastfeed for 6 months or more making Miami-Dade the leader in breastfeeding duration in the state of Florida. WIC is also working with vendors to make it easier to shop for healthy WIC foods. As of December 2017, 250 stores currently participate in the WIC program. Of these, 18 have implemented the "WIC Shelves" initiative, which utilizes a designated area to showcase WIC foods. This makes shopping easier for our WIC families and improves service capacity at the vendor level.

WIC is committed to developing partnerships in our community and leveraging these relationships to create a network of referrals for our clients. In 2017, WIC sponsored two major community events, the 6th Annual Breastfeeding Awareness Walk and the 4th Annual Homestead/Florida City Health & Resource Fair. Combined, the events hosted over 3,800 attendees, 80+ partners, and provided over 60 screenings to residents of Miami-Dade County. We also partnered with the Read to Learn Books for free program to improve literacy amongst young children. In 2017, WIC provided over 67,000 free books to children in our centers, and there are plans to expand the program in four more WIC sites in 2018. Miami-Dade WIC also works closely with the Healthy Start MomCare program by facilitating a seamless referral process between the two agencies. In 2017, the MomCare program referred a total of 4,194 pregnant women to WIC. The coordination between our programs ensures appropriate prenatal care and healthy babies in our community. Lastly, the WIC program partnered with the Summer Breakspot Food Program which targets food security in our youth during the summer months when the school lunch program is non-operational. In the summer of 2017, nearly 7,000 hot lunches were served to children at our WIC sites.

COMMUNITY HEALTH & PLANNING

The Office of Community Health and Planning (OCH&P) houses programs that provide comprehensive, community based health promotion and wellness services designed to reduce major behavioral risk factors associated with chronic diseases. The office aims to enhance skills, knowledge, motivation, and opportunities for individuals, organizations, health care providers, small businesses, health insurers, and communities to develop and maintain healthy lifestyles. The following programs are housed under this office: The Consortium for a Healthier Miami-Dade (Consortium), Community Health Action Team (CHAT), Healthy Start Data Management(HSDM), and Tobacco Prevention and Control.

Community Health Action Team

Community Health Action Team (CHAT) is a mobile public health response outreach team consisting of nurses, community health workers and representatives, and a nutritionist. CHAT provides specialized public health services (including prevention, education, advocacy, regulation, and direct services) within Miami-Dade County through outreach and specific on-site health center locations. Initiatives and services have an overall goal of low-

ering the incidence of chronic disease and obesity by raising awareness of proper nutrition and a healthy lifestyle.

Healthy Start Data Management

Healthy Start Data Management (HSDM) is responsible for processing, monitoring, assurance, and distribution of the Healthy Start (HS) prenatal and postnatal risk screening forms to Healthy Start Providers.

Tobacco Prevention and Control

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of death and disease in the United States. Smoking contributes to several chronic diseases, including lung disease, cancer, heart disease, and stroke. The Tobacco Prevention and Control program works to decrease smoking, tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke in Miami-Dade County. Issues addressed include counteracting point of sale tobacco advertisement, educating young adults and youth on the harms of tobacco use, smoke-free housing, tobacco free worksites and providing cessation resources to the community.



THE CONSORTIUM FOR A HEALTHIER MIAMI-DADE

One of the major accomplishments for the Florida Department of Health in Miami Dade County is our ability to continue to have strong partnerships within our community based initiative, The Consortium for a Healthier Miami Dade (Consortium). The Consortium was established in 2003 by the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County to address the increasing rate of chronic disease in the community. In the area of public health, one agency alone cannot do the enormous task of influencing the entire population; however, through collaboration the Consortium's vision of a healthy environment, healthy lifestyles and a healthy community for all Miami-Dade County residents and visitors will be fulfilled. The Office of Community Health & Planning provides staffing for the initiative.

Through the various committees the Consortium focuses on the following:

- Prevention through education, and the support of policy, systems and environmental changes that encourage healthy living.
- Reducing and eliminating health disparities among high-risk populations.
- Provision of educational forums, programs, and screenings.
- Collaboration and leveraging of resources.
- Implementation of evidence based practices, community focused programs and services.
- Increasing access to health services, healthy foods and healthy environments.

With funding from the Partnerships to Improve Community Health grant, the community has seen marked improvement in the areas of tobacco free environments, improved access to nutrition, increased physical activity and clinical linkages. Through the work of the Consortium for a Healthier Miami-Dade we were able to reach 1,728,614 residents or 69.24% of the population. The following are our accomplishments:

- Increase the number of Public/Affordable MUH with Improved access to smoke-free and/or tobacco-free environments in the City of Hialeah.
- Increase the number of people with improved access to environments with healthy food and beverage options through the Healthy Happens Here Restaurant Initiative. Over 122 restaurants throughout the county are active participants.

.....

- Increase the number of people with improved access to physical activity opportunities through community design, and land use. This was accomplished by the following tools: Active Design Miami and Complete Street Guidelines. The Active Design Miami book is a tool that will help municipalities create designs and policy strategies for healthier communities. The Consortium for a Healthier Miami Dade has been able to encourage policy adoption and resolutions with 10 municipalities.
- The Complete Streets Design Guidelines was a second tool that was developed with the purpose of providing policy and guidance to all involved parties as it relates to street design projects. While this is closely related to the Active Design Guidelines, this tool provides detailed steps on how to effectively implement street projects that promote the health and wellbeing for all users.
- Increase the number of Recreation Areas with improved access to physical activity opportunities through Miami-Dade County Parks. This was accomplished through the Parks305 mobile web application (<https://parks305.org/>). This application promotes physical activity and educates through health messaging. The web application is a one-stop resource for information on county, municipal, state and federal parks in Miami-Dade. In collaboration with the University of Miami, Salter-Mitchell, Inc. and Miami-Dade County Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces(MDPROS), enhancements were done to the Park 305 mobile web application to include additional health messaging.
- Increase the number of people with improved opportunities for chronic disease prevention, risk reduction or management through clinical and community linkages through the use of the Journey to Wellness prescription program. A prescription is given to residents to promote physical activity.
- The Make Healthy Happen Miami media campaign that occurred during the period of April-September 2017, resulted in more than 79 messages being awarded. During this time, the total number of impressions generated were 14,744,457. Ads have been placed using, TV, traditional radio and streaming radio ads, and social media placements. There were also outreach activities and press releases that when coupled with the traditional avenues for media, allowed us to have a greater impact on the community.

Community Relations



COMMUNICATION & LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

The Office of Communication and Legislative Affairs supports the mission of the Department of Health (DOH) through the provision of communication products and services that meet the needs of the agency, customers, partners and stakeholders. The Office works closely with the state's Office of Communication and the Office of Legislative Affairs. The Office provides information to our residents and visitors so that they are able to make good health choices, and alerts the public in the event of an emergency. The Office works closely with appointed and elected officials to expand public health services and resources.

The Office of Communication is available 24/7 to respond to inquiries from the press. The Office monitors relevant media activity; drafts and distributes press releases, op-eds and other media outreach; provides media training to subject matter experts; prepares written materials; translates documents and coordinates crisis communication. The Office coordinates staff appearances on television and radio talk shows in English, Spanish and Creole.

The Office of Communication and Legislative Affairs supports public health programs in developing flyers, brochures and other educational materials distributed at health fairs and other major events. The Office submits information for posting on the social media sites of the DOH.

The Office of the Mayor of Miami-Dade County, the Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership, and the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County convened the Miami-Dade County HIV/AIDS "Getting 2 Zero" Task Force to address the HIV epidemic. The taskforce developed recommendations to target comprehensive prevention, a quality service delivery system, social support services and innovative social policies with the goal of "getting to zero" new HIV infection and AIDS cases in Miami-Dade County. HIV testing is an integral component of these efforts.

Mayor Carlos A. Gimenez in partnership with the State Attorney Katherine Fernandez-Rundle, the Department of Children and Families, **the Florida Department of Health** and Miami-Dade County's Board of County Commissioners Chairman Bovo, founded the Opioid Addiction Task Force--charged with developing an effective action plan that addresses the reduction of opioid and heroin addiction, prevents overdose deaths and improves the quality of life in our community.



The Department held the first ever DOH - Miami-Dade Partner Fair and Conference and brought together **165 exhibitors/partners** to provide information on community services and resources and offered conference participants the opportunity to select from 20 different Community Health and Resource learning sessions.



The Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program is a special program for uninsured women, who are between 50 and 64 years old. The FBC-CEDP provides a vital link to screenings, diagnostics, and treatment services for women who are residents of Miami-Dade or Monroe County. Free or low cost services are provide through public and private partnerships.
