### Miami-Dade County Health Department H1N1 Vaccine Campaign

The Miami Dade County Health Department kicked off the H1N1 Vaccine Campaign Monday, October 19 by opening up its 4 clinics and offering free H1N1 Vaccine to the community. The clinics will be open after working hours (5pm-9pm) and on Saturday (see page 2 for clinic hours) to give the public the opportunity to bring their families to get the H1N1 vaccine. In addition, we have included a list of Federal Qualified Health Center that will also be offering the free H1N1 Vaccine.

The CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) has recommended that vaccination efforts should focus on people in five target groups who are at higher risk for 2009 H1N1 influenza-related complications, are likely to come in contact with influenza viruses as part of their occupation and could transmit influenza viruses to others in medical care settings, or are close contacts of infants younger than 6 months (who are too young to be vaccinated).

Initial Target Groups Are:

ACIP recommends that programs and providers administer vaccine to people in the following five target groups (order of target groups does not indicate priority):

- · pregnant women,
- people who live with or provide care for infants younger than 6 months (e.g., parents, siblings, and day care providers),
- health care and emergency medical services personnel,
- · people 6 months through 24 years of age, and,
- people 25 years through 64 years of age who have certain medical conditions that put them at higher risk for influenzarelated complications.

Miami Dade County Health Department encourages to get vaccinated for both seasonal flu and H1N1 flu, it is the best protection we have against the flu. In addition, we would like to remind everyone to practice good health habits that help prevent the flu.

#### Remember to take everyday actions to stay healthy.

- 1.Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- 2. Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- 3. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread that way.
- 4. Stay home if you get sick. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.



Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is a disease that gets worse over time and makes it difficult to breathe.

COPD can cause coughing that produces large amounts of mucus, wheezing, shortness of breath, chest tightness, and other symptoms.

Cigarette smoking is the leading cause of COPD. Most people who have COPD smoke or used to smoke. Long-term exposure to other lung irritants, such as air pollution, chemical fumes, or dust, also may contribute to COPD

#### Facts:

COPD is a major cause of disability, and it's the fourth leading cause of death in the United States. More than 12 million people are currently diagnosed with COPD. An additional 12 million likely have the disease and don't even know it.


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### Miami-Dade County Health Department EDC-IS Influenza/Respiratory Illness Surveillance Report

Week 42: 10/18/2009 - 10/24/2009

Miami Dade County Health Department EDC-IS collects and analyzes weekly information on influenza activity in Miami-Dade County. On a daily basis, selected Miami-Dade County hospitals electronically transmit hospital emergency department data to the Miami-Dade County Health Department.

This data is then categorized into 10 distinct syndromes. The influenza-like illness (ILI) syndrome consists of fever with either cough or sore throat. It can also include a chief complaint of "flu". Each week, staff will determine the percentage of all emergency department visits that fall into the ILI category.



During this period, there were 7,797 ED visits; among them 1,008 (12.9%) were ILI. At the same week of last year, 4.5% of ED visits were ILI.

# PARTICIPATE IN INFLUENZA SENTINEL PROVIDER SURVEILLANCE

The Miami-Dade County Health Department NEEDS Influenza Sentinel Providers!!

Sentinel providers are key to the success of the Florida Department of Health's Influenza Surveillance System. Data reported by sentinel providers gives a picture of the influenza virus and ILI activity in the U.S. and Florida which can be used to guide prevention and control activities, vaccine strain selection, and patient care.

- Providers of any specialty, in any type of practice, are eligible to be sentinel providers.
- Most providers report that it takes less than 30 minutes a week to compile and report data on the total number of patients seen and the number of patients seen with influenza-like illness.
- Sentinel providers can submit specimens from a subset of patients to the state laboratory for virus isolation free of charge.
