





Different registered HIV testing sites currently provide services in Miami-Dade County

The goal of HIV counseling and testing is to assist individuals in assessing their risk and understanding their test results and to help them develop a personalized prevention plan. Counseling includes notifying the patient of the availability of partner counseling and referral services, the benefits of such services, and the confidentiality protections available as part of such services. HIV-infected persons and those at risk for HIV are referred to needed services, including substance abuse treatment, Healthy Start, prevention case management, and medical care.

We now have medications that can effectively reduce levels of HIV to an undetectable level. That means an HIV+ person can live a longer, healthier life and that ability to transmit the virus to another person is greatly lessened. This, in turn, means a reduction in new cases of HIV infection in our community.

Rapid HIV Test

All adolescent and adults (ages 13-64) should be tested for HIV at least once during their life time. Person at risk for HIV should be tested **annually**. HIV antibody test look for antibodies to HIV in your body or oral fluid. With a rapid antibody point of care screening test, results are ready in **20 minutes or less**.

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)

For persons at risk for HIV, a pill (Truvada®) once daily, can reduce the risk of acquiring HIV by over 90%. Condoms are still recommended during sex to prevent other sexually transmitted infections, which are increasing and which can increase risk of acquiring HIV.

Antiretroviral Therapy (ART)

For persons newly diagnosed with HIV, starting ART with a provider immediately after diagnosis improves health outcomes by preventing disease progression and reducing viral load, making transmission highly unlikely.
